Steeler's Smash Way to League Title

League-leading champs for the 1983-84 season were the Steelers who proved they were as strong as their name as they rolled over the opposition on the way to the title.

The past season saw the Variety Bowling League revert back to an often used format of 33 straight weeks of competition. As is the case sometimes, with this set-up, the team that gets out in front early will be the league champ. While the Steeler's didn't exactly leap out of the starting gate, they did forge to the front fairly early and went on to win by a substantial margin.

The early contenders for the crown were Chuck's Golf Shop who sprinted to the lead and held it for the first five weeks.

Week six was the 1/8th pole where the powerful Steelers made their move going to the front and remaining there for the rest of the year.

Their record for the year was a potent 182—82, fas surpassing even the second place finishers. Captain Mike Kecyk was the spark for the team as he poured it on to finish third high average for the year at 119. With high singles of 413 and 415 and a high triple of 160, Kecyk was up to the task of reclaiming his spot as one of the top average bowlers in the league as he upped his average from a mediocre, for him, 113 in '83.

Teammates Jay Favazza, 107 average and 360 high triple, and Don Sutherland, his best year ever with a 111 average—378 triple—augmented Mike's efforts as the Steeler's were over 1600 fifteen times for the year and reached the 1700 plateau three times.

Former major league baseball star Ron Stahre, (he's the one with the cap), contributed a solid 104 season to assist his mates while veterans George Christopher, 92 and Joe Francis, 97, contributed some fine nights for the champs.

An oddity along the way was the night Kecyk rolled a big 413, only to have his team collapse and knock down only 1358 pins for three strings. They still took six however, as the hapless Coop could only muster 1267 total.

Our congrats to the Steelers, our 1984 Variey League team champs.

Second and third place in the league became a see-saw battle as the Steelers went merrily on their way. Chuck's held down second until the 14th week when Destino's made their presence known and took over only to lose the next week to the Liquor Locker. The Locker held on for a while finally dropping back to third with six weeks remaining. Again Destino's took second spot and went on to become runners up for the year.


In truth, Destino's proved to be quite a team as they they outpowered the chasers and finished with a 162—102 record. Sparked by newcomer Ned Abell's 110 average, the team bowled as a unit with George Matta, Howie Lodge and

Jack DeCoste all posting 105's. Matta had a high of 358, Howie a 380, and Jack a 360 high. Russ McKowan threw in a nifty 102 average as they were a man short most of the season.

Along the way Destino's captured team high triple (1720) and third high triple (1711) to prove their claim to second place.

The Liquor Locker made some noise for a while as they fought for second with Destino's and the Steelers. Riley's average and 400's were a factor in their drive but was not enough and they had to settle for third. Myron Romank and old reliable Oscar Dennis had 103 average along the way and Larry Doyle counted a 101. Bob Cavanaugh had an off year at 99 and Tim Davis failed to round out the year. They did have first high team single with a 622 and had a 1710 triple a few weeks later.

In the usual see-saw battle between himself and Roger Campbell, Don Riley returns once again as league high average winner.

Rolling a 122 season, Riley has now tied Campbell for the most wins at nine and has been second on five tries. Jack Larsen remains far ahead with 15 victories to his credit, a record which both will be shooting for.

During the long campaign, Riley had two 400's to his credit and a high single of 160. As captain of the third place Liquor Locker, he finds there's no substitute for winning as he reclaims his crown.

Leading after nine weeks, Riley took a breather as Kecyk made a brief two-week surge. The 13th week saw him once again on top and fighting to hold off perennial challenger Campbell. At the end of 31 weeks there were just 9 pins difference between them and it looked like another photo finish. After 32 weeks the margin was still only 27. The final match of the year saw Riley hit a big 377 as Campbell could manage only 317.

Holder of the league high of 123.7, Don has also posted two additional 123 seasons, something unparalled in our history.


as he, like Riley, bowled two 400 nights, had high single of 177 and another single of 160.

So close, in fact, that decimal points have been used to seperate these two bowling friends and competitors. In 1979 it was Roger with a 116.49 to eek out Riley who had a 116.43. Now that's close.

So much space has been devoted to these two, we will now move on to third spot wherein lies another close foe, Mike Kecyk.


Kecyk led the league just once but has been a third place finisher far too many times during his brief tenure with us.

For the year he totaled 119, and like the other two had double 400's to his credit. His 160 also tied the same trio together and only time will tell when he gets another shot at the crown. Stay posted for the battle of the big three in 1985.



Ned Abell Our Rookie of the Year

Ned Abell joined the Variety League this year and found the lanes to his liking as he rolled a 114 average and won the coveted Rookie of the Year Award. While there is no monetary reward for this title, there is the satisfaction of being the best of the new crop of regular bowlers.

For the first few weeks it appeared that Abell would take it all as he maintained a 120-128 average. Near mid-season he was slowly saging down the ladder and seemed doomed to finish in the 111 range. With a slight fuel adjustment, Ned turned on the afterburners and plowed his way back up to finish at 114.79.

With a high three of 386 and a high 159 single, Abell was in the 370 area many times and deserves to be cited as our rookie of the year.


